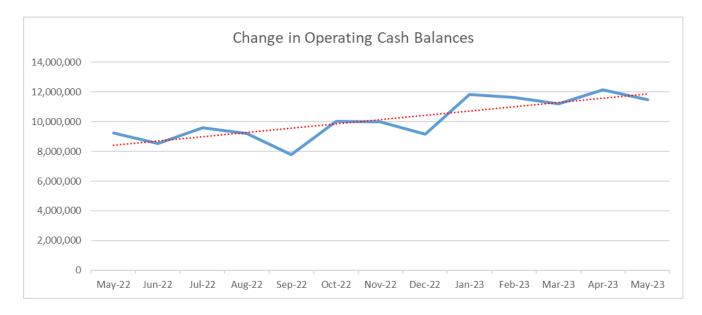

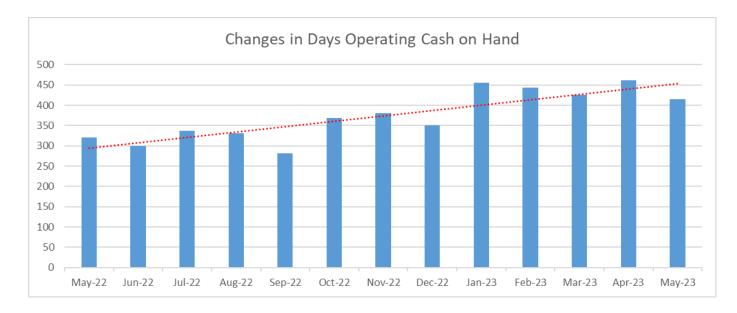

# **Cash Report:**

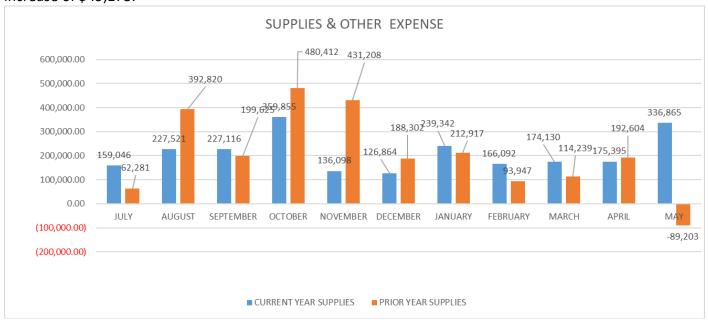
The attached Cash Operating Budget Report is for May 2023 the 11<sup>th</sup> month of the 2023 Fiscal Year. The target for 11/12 of the year is 92% for revenue and expense if activity was spread equally over 12 months. Revenue is at 123% which is above target, and expenses are currently at 89%, which is slightly under the target.



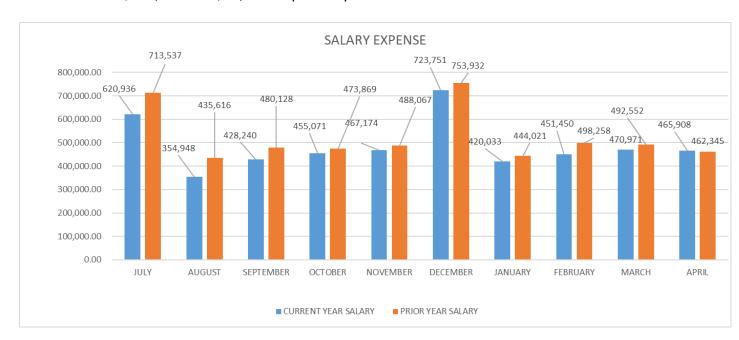
Cash at the end of May 2023 was approximately 24% higher than May 2022, for a \$2,333,054 difference. The number of days cash on hand in May 2023 is 415, and as of May 2022, it was 320 days, an increase of 95 days.

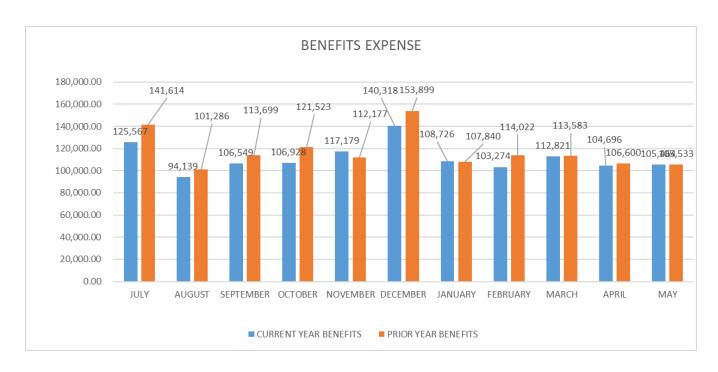


Supplies and Other expenses for May 2023 were \$336,865 which is higher compared to (\$89,203) in May 2022 due to a transfer of operating expenses to a nonoperating fund. The YTD Supplies and Other Expenses for FY23 are \$2,328,325 compared to \$2,279,152 for FY22, which is an increase of \$49,173.



Salaries and Benefits for the month of May 2023 were \$472,998 and \$105,464 respectively, which is higher compared to \$422,649 and \$105,533 in May of last year. The YTD Salaries and Benefits for FY23 are \$5,331,481 and \$1,225,660 compared to \$5,664,973 and \$1,291,774 for FY22, which is a decrease of \$333,492 and \$66,114 respectively.

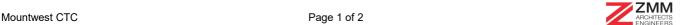

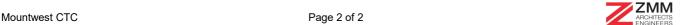

# June 2023 President's Report

### Foundation

- o Chris Miller is our first Emergency Fund donor, \$10k.
- An additional \$20k donation has been committed for scholarships by an anonymous donor.
- Evaluating plans for 23/24 events.
- Continuing pursuit of grants, which have produced a high ROI.

### Enrollment

- Summer enrollment is up 46%.
- o Fall is currently trending up 9% for adults.
  - JumpStart is trending towards an increase from 125 to 175.
    - State funding of Dual Credit is still in development. We have been told we will be compensated this Fall.
  - First time freshman enrollment is up 36%.
  - Continuing student enrollment is up 5%.

#### Recent Activities

- o Spoke to Best of Class at Museum of Art.
- Spoke to seniors at Spring Valley High School during senior recognition.
- Presented to superintendents and school board members for Huntington and Charleston areas.
- Participated in Huntington legislative visit, including welcoming comments, and tours of airport and Nucor.
- o Participated in statewide presidents retreat and planning.
- Attended Community Colleges of Appalachia. Networked with G. Manchin, and other colleges and companies, in pursuit of Appalachian Center of Excellence in Cyber Security.
- Attended Cyber Security conference in Seattle to advance our endorsement as a national center of excellence.
  - This process will take at least a year.
  - Also lobbied support from Microsoft for Appalachian Center.

# • Academic Programs Updates

- Alcohol and Drug Counseling has 20 students. A strong start for a new program. An additional cohort is being considered.
- Surgical Technician has 28 students in the pathway.
- o Utility Construction currently has 8 students registered for the fall.
- Two Benedum Planning Grants approved.
  - Heritage Farms
  - Hope Nation

# **Dive Brief:**

- Undergraduate enrollment in spring 2023 slipped just 0.2% from the previous year, representing a loss of some 25,000 students, according to a report released Wednesday by the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center.
- While this is an improvement over the 3.9% decline the previous spring, undergraduate enrollment remains well below pre-pandemic levels.
- Community colleges saw a 0.5% uptick in enrollment, of roughly 22,000 students. The growth, which comes after significant declines in the last two years, stemmed from younger enrollees, such as those in dual-enrollment high school programs.

"Students are increasingly looking towards programs and majors that they can easily see a direct link to to the workforce," he said.
